Industry Comment

Do not want Trotting continued.

Trotting has impacted Tasmanian racing in the last 12 months.

Not a good economic decision to continue trotting.

Wagering on Trotting has proven on the mainland that it has the ability to generate greater turnover than pacing races.

Trotting has diverted prizemoney away from pacing. It is not self funding.

Action to increase number of trotters in state.

Analysis (based on the period 1/7/18 to 4/9/19)

Based on the commentary from the forum meetings, Trotting is not supported by a majority of the Industry.

The industry view was that funds would be better spent on additional 2YO and 3YO races and incentives.

However it is appropriate to set out the facts with some analysis of both pacing and trotting.

Historical data

Trotting was re-introduced, after 90 odd years, in a trial format on 1 July 2018 for a 12 month period. This was extended in May 2019 until 31 December 2019 whilst a review of the Harness Industry was carried out.

Up to 4th September 2019 there have been 41 trotting races run. All analysis refers to these 41 races / race meetings.

- Tasmanian Trotting Club 24 races
- Launceston Pacing Club 15 races
- Devonport Harness Racing Club 2 races

The average field size for trotting in Tasmania is 5.95 starters per race

The data only reflects meetings in which a trotting race was held to ensure we are comparing (as best we can) races under similar dates and times.

The average number of races per meeting was 8.41 with the trotting race at position 6.8 (effectively on average it was the second last race)

On average the trotting race ranked 6.6 (effectively second last). However this was generally the case whether the trot race was first or 6th or last. Out of 41 meetings the trot race was ranked 4th or better in turnover only 6 times.

The average wagering gap overall is \$39,572 and for 6 or more starters is \$37,139 per race.

Analysis

Population

- Since 1 July 2018, 22 trotters relocated to Tasmania, it is estimated that there are currently 10 12 in state.
- Since 1 July 2018, out of 153 trainers only 17 (or 11%) have trained a trotter.

Prizemoney

- The total amount of stakes allocated to trotting since 1 July 2018 to 4 September 2019 is \$326,400 (41 races).
- The average stakes per trot race are \$7,960 (41 races) with a high of \$14,000 and a low of \$5,500.
- The average stakes per pacing race (over the same meetings) are \$8,512 with a high of \$75,000 and a low of \$3,500.
- The total amount of prizemoney paid to trotting in the FY19 season was \$248,258. This represents close to 4.6% of Harness Prizemoney allocation. In FY20 to 4th September 2019 we have paid a further \$49,512. Any unallocated prizemoney as per the trotting prizemoney grid was returned to the stakes pool. This amounted to \$23,842 for FY19 and \$4,788 for FY20.

Broadcast information

- The broadcast split for trotting races has been 56.1% on SKY1 and 43.9% on SKY2.
- The broadcast split for pacing races has been 55.6% on SKY1 and 44.4% on SKY2.

Additional matters

- The Tasmanian Trotting Club secured a 3 year \$25,000 sponsorship from Aldebaran Park who are a trotting only stud.
- The Tasracing mobile is currently used as Aldebaran Park advertising with supporting marketing material at zero cost to TTC.
- The Tasmania Trotting Club have syndicated 2 trotters with an estimated 60 owners in both horses.



Analysis

Comparative race data

- There have been 69 divided pacing races since 1 July 2018
- Divided pacing races at the *same* meeting a trot race was held:
 - 28 divided races. \$69,200 additional prizemoney would be required for these to have been run at base stake level.
- Dual engaged horses on the same weekend when a trot race was held:
 - 22 weekends @ average 15.5 horses per weekend running twice.
- Dual engaged horses on a weekend when a trot race was not held:
 - 16 weekends @ average 15 horses per weekend running twice.
- The average number of ballots for pacing horses at a meeting holding a trot race is 4.09 horses balloted per meeting.

Points to note:

- 1. The divided races were conducted at the prizemoney level a step down from the standard on the program. Divided races at a meeting that saw \$8,100 races would see divided races conducted at \$5,500. Those at a secondary \$5,500 meeting would be run at \$3,500.
- 2. For the 69 divided races to have been run at full stakes the required funding would have been \$164,700.
- 3. Under the current programming there are not enough horses to fill a second meeting each week.
- 4. Changes to programming targeted at maidens and horses with restricted wins/low ratings / standing starts / mares would assist in reducing dual engaged.
- 5. Changes to criteria for trainers encouragement races 18mths ago also impacted the desire and size of the potential field.
- 6. Under the FY20 budget it is not possible to run any divided races at full stakes and trotting races.



Analysis

Commentary

- At present a trotting race turns over on average 25.75% less than a pacing race in the same meeting.
- This equates to \$39,572 per race in turnover and \$989.3 in race field fees at the 2.5% average.
- Extrapolated out this is a potential reduction in / loss of revenue of \$40,561 across the 41 races.
- The issue of whether we have the horse population to fill this gap with pacers is mitigated by a return to race programming as in 2016 targeted at maidens, restricted win horses, mares, trainers encouragement races and standing starts.
- Alternatively this may be a trigger to import additional pacers and stimulate breeding (acknowledge this would take three years to work through).
- Greater field sizes does not equal greater turnover though on average field sizes over 6 generate higher turnover.
- Trotting does not seem to have had an impact on pacing horses gaining a start with the average number of horses balloted reducing significantly since trotting was introduced. This number now sits at 4 horses per meeting. Unfortunately there is no way to link the introduction of trotting to this effect as there have been other measures taken to reduce the number of ballots.
- It has been suggested that should trotting be discontinued then dual engaged runners per weekend would grow significantly, given the current pacing population could not support additional racing. If this were the case then we would be able to change programming and race conditions to mitigate. Additionally divided races would be impacted (could be reduced) and there would be the opportunity to provide trainer incentives.
- Whilst there is a current shortage of young horses 2YO or 3YO races are at a higher level than 2 years ago.
- The challenge is evaluating the level of risk by splitting a small market resources to fund an non core brand whilst not addressing the issues with the core brand.



Analysis

Commentary

- Is it more productive and less risk to invest funds in the current core brand and deal with the issues of breeding and programming or do we utilise scarce and limited resources to establish a second brand over the next few years.
- It should be noted that the other large PRA's have been force funding trotting for a number of years. In particular, Queensland trotting has been continuous for 51 years (September 1968) However it is only in the last three years that they have increased funding and focus on the brand with some success. Trotting is still only around 8% of their races.
- Victoria is the primary state with a trotting breeding industry. At present they have conceded that they have bred more trotters than they require. (Anecdotal)
- The industry itself has not adopted trotting with only 11% of trainers becoming involved. It is unclear as to whether this is due to the level of uncertainty associated with a trial or other concerns.
- On a purely ROI position if you assumed you could guarantee replacement of the race then performance to date shows you would achieve a higher return with a pacing race.
- It is questionable whether the code has the funds available to invest in a second brand and address the issues of breeding and population with the main brand.
- If trotting is discontinued then there is opportunity to program additional races for maidens, restricted win horses, mares, trainers encouragement races and standing starts with no impact to stakes.

Options

The two (2) options to be considered are:

1. Trotting to be permanently introduced

- 2 races per month are run at a stakes level of \$5.5k and \$8.1k (equates to \$163k).
- This equates to 2.8% of total prizemoney based on the current stakes allocation of \$5,728,981.
- The races would be conducted under the same nomination rules currently being finalised for pacing thus the minimum field size for trotting would be raised from 4 to 6. Nominations of 3 or more to be extended with races deleted with anything less than 6 acceptors.
- Only Tasmania trained trotters to be eligible to participate in Tasmanian races.
- Performance would be reviewed regularly and the position updated based on participation.

2. Trotting to be discontinued in Tasmania

- Trotting would cease to be programmed on the Tasmanian Harness Calendar as of 1 January 2020.
- The Tasracing Off The Track program to assist with horses that require rehoming or retraining.
- Alternatively for the trotters that decide to remain and race in Tasmania, Tasracing will look to amend the handicapping policy to allow trotters into pacing races.
- It is possible that TTC may lose the Aldebaran Park sponsorship which we estimate has \$12.5k to go (18mth / 36mth agreement).
- The Hobart mobile would then need to be rebranded with the space again offered to TTC at \$0 cost for their usage.
- The funds reclaimed would be allocated to low rated horses and maidens, restricted win horses, mares, trainers encouragement races and standing starts.
